CANDLELIGHTING CEREMONY - "HARMONY"

LECTURER: One definition of HARMONY is "A state of order, agreement, accord." It characterizes unity among persons or things. The word implies mutual respect, goodwill and cooperation. In all our Grange work the characteristics of HARMONY should be prevalent. We work together for the Good of the Order, for the benefit of our homes, our communities, our churches, ourselves...because certainly a harmonious existence benefits those who live it.

RED: We all know red stands for bravery. We may never need to fight or shed blood for a cause, but this is a powerful color, which should inspire us to stand for our rights and be brave in adhering to what we believe to be worth keeping.

WHITE: We all know white represents purity. The Bible, on which all our ritualism is founded, teaches us to live in HARMONY.

BLUE: This color stands for truth, trustworthiness and steadfastness to our cause, not only in the Grange, but in life. Nothing will promote HARMONY in existence more quickly than these three attributes.

LECTURER: These three colors harmonize a combination of colors with which we are familiar, and to which Grangers all show reverence and respect ... our Flag.

GREEN: That beautiful color which carpets the earth with its many varied shades so prevalent in town and country alike speaks to us of refreshing newness of life. Green is a color which stresses new growth, our committees and their workers need to grow also, striving for new ideas as well as new goals in our work. Let us also grow in HARMONY with others.

YELLOW: This color is repeated over and over again during the seasons of the year, from the pale yellows of the early daffodil to the graceful gold of the forsythia in the spring; than we have the delicate yellow roses and the buttercups of the field and pastures in the summer months; and the goldenrod and chrysanthemums of the fall. These, combined with the brilliant sunlight of out days and the pale moon of our nights, are constant reminders of the fact that we live in the blessed sunlight of faith and the many varieties of yellow to which we are exposed certainly should remind us to live in HARMONY by the Golden Rule.

ORANGE: A more intense color than yellow, this is found in our summer flowers, but is especially prevalent in the flowers and foliage of the autumn season. Should not this color encourage us all to strive more intensely for HARMONY among our Brothers and Sisters in the Grange and to broaden our own scope of working harmoniously with others in our community?

The depth of this color should remind us of the richness of our opportunity as Grange members ... we should use this opportunity to work together in HARMONY, not only in fun and lightheartedness, but with serious consideration for important items in our Grange work as well. In spite of the fun, we have in our organization, let us remember our responsibility to be serious when the occasion warrants it.

VIOLET: The soft beauty of the lilac is immediately brought to mind when we think of this color, which has added a harmonious touch to many homes over the years. Can you imagine a set of farm buildings without lilacs? Of all the colors in the spectrum, Violet represents, to many a reminder of days gone by, but also a harmonious blending of the old with the new... a means by which we of today can relate to our Brother and Sister Grangers of years gone by and continue in HARMONY and understanding.
