Community Service is a non-paying job performed by a person or a group of people for the benefit of their community or an individual in need. Voluntary work, intended to be for the common good. Individual Projects done can count for Grange hours.

ASPCA – donate funds, toys, food, towels, blankets, for our four legged friends

Barbara Bush Children's Hospital – donate funds, baby hats, toys.

Children's Home for Little Wanderers – donate funds, toys, new clothing, hats, & mittens

House In the Woods Military and Family Retreat, donate funds. They provide veterans and families with support by taking them hunting, fishing, camping, hiking, etc., at no cost to the veterans & family.

Plant trees or wildflowers.

Put on a play at your school, a fair or festival about local environmental or human needs issues.

Collect items for a time capsule.

Make treats for a local senior home. Or veterans home.

Make assorted mobiles from cards for residents in senior or assisted living, or veterans homes, who may not have anyone, or who can't have real flowers. Make bouquet or artificial plants to give to residents.

Provide an assortment of books (all types & age groups) shelters, nursing homes and veterans homes. Include large print books.

Provide small stuffed animals for residents to have as pets or remind them of their pet.

Provide boxes of cards for Nursing home residents to use to send to their friends & family.

Take coloring books, assorted pictures and difficulty, large crayons (to hold easier) & colored pencils to local senior home.

Craft nights and Family game nights.

Lap Blankets for nursing homes.

Baby hats for local hospitals.

Blood drive with American Red Cross.

Team up with local scouts to help them get badges – cooking, sewing, quilting, etc.

Provide artificial Christmas tree to nursing home, veterans home or shelter.

Form a litter patrol on school or park ground. Provide gloves, masks, trash bags, etc.

Open halls for Mother's Day/Father's Day Craft and Card making. Provide materials.

Non-perishable food drives.

In December, contact a local tree farm or nursery about donating a Christmas tree to a needy family, shelter or nursing home.

Write letters to service men/women.

Put together care package for service men/women.

Hold a Teddy Bear and Friends (stuffed animals) drive. Donate the collected animals to a homeless shelter for new arrivals. Also... check with your local police station or fire station. Many are happy to take the Teddy and Friends; a teddy bear can be a comfort to children in times of distress.

Collect gently used clothing and donate them for a dress up area at a daycare or family shelter.

Make a holiday basket, not just for Christmas, for someone in need or crisis.

Collect unused make-up, perfume, and other cosmetics for a center for abused women.

Collect suitcases for abused women's shelter.

Make center pieces, holiday cards, birthday cards, and notes for assisted living facilities, children in hospital wards, or meals on wheels.

Donate old eyeglasses or sunglasses to an organization such as the Lions or place that recycles them for the needy.

Collect old stuffed animals and dolls, clean them up, repair them and then donate them.

Collect broken crayons from local restaurants like Applebee's and make crayons in small muffin cups to donate to local school and special needs classes easier to grip.

Improve the school grounds.

Develop and maintain a recycling program at school.

Collect food & snacks, warm clothing, socks, toys, or personal care items for the needy. Deliver to shelters. *Remember shelters are in need all year long.*

Plant produce. Donate harvest to a local food bank.

Plant seeds. Sell the flowers or plants and donate the proceeds to a local organization in need.

Pick up litter at the park.

Meet the candidates – must provide equal time to all parties.

Clean veterans headstones at cemeteries. Update cemetery records.

Help Fire & Rescue purchase GPS systems for search and rescue teams.

Right-To-Read® book project collection and distribution.

Stuff-A-Stocking or help a family in need (anytime or all year long).

Backpacks for Foster Children, school projects, or children involved in court cases.

School and regular Bus Stop Improvement. Playground set ups or repairs.

Establish a computer recycling program using our outdated but still good computers we may find too “slow” but are still good to someone who can’t afford to buy one. Possibly set them up at Grange halls for training/learning and all to have access to.

Beatification and Earth Awareness -- host a plant or seed swap.

Safety Awareness around your home and community.

Words for Thirds® dictionary program.

Parks for Animals & pets – clean up or get the community to contribute one

Maintain cemeteries and road sides – combine with local organizations to keep road sides clean

VA Project – Veteran Administrations, VA homes, group homes – donate hygiene items, socks, take a trip to play cards, or games, do crafts, read to them, etc.

Maine Wreaths across America

School for the Deaf – Community Gardens

Hearing aid fund – raise funds to have hearing aid fund to help Grangers who need hearing aids.

Pennies for a purpose – collect pennies or loose change, combining with local organizations for different organizations.

Food for Thought Program – Combine with National – promote to local schools

- More children have high blood pressure now due to unhealthy diets
- Put a table together during Grange Month and invite groups/families to heart healthy snacks and games.

Adopt a Veteran or Nursing Home for the holidays and have a card writing day and send cards to each resident (not just Christmas).

Holiday cards for Heros. Honor Local Heros. Assist with getting plaques in communities to honor local heroes.

1. Tree Illumination Night

- a. Combine with local organizations, have 3 ft trees donated with set of lights and decorated with a theme – scratch tickets, money, kitchen items, decorations, gift certificates, fishing, etc.
- b. Advertise in local newspapers for each area promote the event.
- c. Sell raffle tickets to raffle off each tree.
- d. Have craft table from one of the committees raising money for their organization.
- e. Bake table for another committee to raise money.
- f. Then at set time illuminate the trees, all at once and then pick raffle winners.

2. Community Service Day

- a. Invite local, regional and state wide community service organizations to set tables and promote volunteering.
- b. Set out tables again, baking, crafts, junior items, to raise funds for each committee.

3. Apron and coffee mug sale
